Hot jobs — for 2 years of education

Recently laid-off going back to school

The recession has lots of people thinking about going back to school and changing careers. Those who have been laid off are looking for new career opportunities, and more importantly, they want a job once they get out of school.

Some view it as an opportunity.

Euteva Lister of Waddell went back to school in January after being downsized from her job in insurance billing. She plans to graduate with a cosmetology degree in February from Empire Beauty School in Avondale.

"People at my age get comfortable at what they are doing," said the 51-year-old, who was laid off once before. "This kind of gave me the kick in the butt to go to something I really wanted to do."

While no career is recession-proof, here are some fast-growing occupations that require two years or less of college and that are poised to be popular through at least 2016, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics.

» 1. Medical assistant

Why it's hot: Like many health-care jobs, medical assistants are increasingly in demand as doctor's offices and hospitals try to meet the needs of an aging population.

What they do: Everything from making appointments and greeting patients to checking vital signs, drawing blood and giving immunizations.

Training: One-year certificate and two-year associate degree.

Starting salary: About \$12 an hour, with bilingual speakers often making more.

» 2. Skin care

Why it's hot: Everyone cares about their appearance and how

they look. It's a reflection of who they are inside, said Frank Schoeneman, chairman of Empire Beauty Schools.

With the recession, people lose self-confidence, so they turn to services such as hair and skin care to help them feel better.

What to know: The biggest challenge is establishing a client base. Once you have that, you can set your own hours, and your clients become some of your best friends, said Jennifer Jenkins, director of cosmetology at Maricopa Skill Center.

What they do: Students train as cosmetologists — who cover skin, hair and nails — or as aestheticians — who cover skin care, facials and makeup.

Training: Varies depending on focus. Cosmetology programs can generally be completed in a year or less.

Starting salary: Varies, but graduates generally earn half of what they charge.

» 3.

Physical-therapy assistant
Why it's hot: People are living longer and more frequently surviving life-threatening ailments such as strokes. Physical therapy is needed to help them live a quality life.

An emphasis on early intervention also is fueling demand for more physical-therapy assistants. Some patients with developmental delays are as young as a few months old.

What to know: Programs are popular and can have waiting lists. Students should have an interest in the human body and how the body functions.

"You're a little bit of a coach, and a friend and a mentor. Sometimes you're a taskmaster," said Peter Zawicki, director of the physical therapist assistant program at Gateway Community College. (Info: 602-286-8046 or www.gatewaycc.edu.)

What they do: Work with patients under the supervision of a physical therapist, who evaluates the patient and decides the plan of care.

Training: Associate's degree.
Starting salary: \$20 to \$25 per hour. On-call or non-benefit jobs can pay \$30 to \$35 an hour.

» 4. Pharmacy technician

Why it's hot: Wherever there is a pharmacy, there is a need for pharmacy technicians. With the aging population and advances in medical care, people increasingly use medicine to maintain a good quality of life.

What to know: Pharmacy techs need to take a test and get national certification after they complete the program. Graduates sometimes continue their education and become pharmacists or go into pharmaceutical sales.

What they do: Prepare prescriptions, count out tablets, label bottles and handle administrative duties such as answering phone calls, stocking shelves, greeting customers and operating a cash register.

Training: 12 weeks.
Starting salary: \$10 an hour.
Programs to check out: Phoenix College (Info: 602-285-7800 or phoenixcollege.edu.)

» 5. Network administration

Why it's hot: The explosion of computer networks and the Internet has created a big demand for specialists to make sure networks function well.

What to know: Students should be detail-oriented, said Fernando Garcia, a Cisco certified instructor at Glendale Community College.

They don't necessarily need to know anything about computer networking when they start the program, but attention to detail is critical.

What they do: Set up, wire and work with computer networks and the Internet.
Training: Three-semester program.

Starting salary: High \$20,000 to low \$30,000. Students can get additional certifications and the more experience they have, the higher their salaries.

Programs to check out: Glendale Community College. (Info: 623-845-3000 or www.gccaz.edu.)

» 6. Veterinary technician

Why it's hot: People are spending more on their pets as the human-animal bond has gone from viewing pets as possessions to viewing them as members of the family.

Veterinarians are increasingly spending their time in surgery and diagnosing and prescribing treatments while vet techs are doing a lot of the other duties.

What to know: The curriculum is very rigorous and scientific. It's not enough to just like animals, said Jill Sheport, director of Mesa Community College's Veterinary Technology Program. You should like science and also remember this is a people field, so good communication skills are necessary.

"The animals don't come in by themselves," she said.


What they do: Vet techs do everything short of surgery or prescribing medicines. They take medical history, give medications, injections and even some medical procedures such as cleaning and monitoring anesthesia.

Training: Two years if completed general-education requirements and other pre-requisites; three years otherwise.

Starting salary: \$26,000 to \$28,000.

My Child's Road Trip to College & Career Vocabulary Part 1

1. **ACT**: a national college admissions examination that consists of four subject areas: English, mathematics, reading, science, plus an optional writing test.
2. **admissions officer/counselor**: college staff person who interviews potential college students.
3. **Advanced Placement**: college-level courses offered at high school in which a student has the opportunity to earn advanced placement, credit or both at a college or university.
4. **Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID)**: college readiness system designed to increase the number of students who enroll in four-year colleges.
5. **application**: a written or printed form on which a request is made.
6. **Arizona High School Graduation Requirements**: the minimum subject credits required to graduate from high school: English-4; Math-4; Science-3; Social Studies-3; CTE/Fine Art-1; Elective-7.
7. **associate's degree**: approximately 60 credit hours of study from a community/junior college qualifications of an applicant.
8. **bachelor's degree**: undergraduate degree granted by four-year colleges and universities; approximately 120-128 hours are typically needed to finish school with this degree.
9. **career**: a chosen pursuit, a profession or occupation; the general course or progression of one's working life or one's professional achievements.
10. **college**: a school, sometimes but not always a university, offering special instruction in professional or technical subjects.
college major: a college or university student's main field of specialization during his or her undergraduate studies.
11. **college fair**: allow students the opportunity to interact with admission representatives from a wide range of postsecondary institutions in one location to discuss course offerings, admission and financial aid requirements, college life in general, and other information pertinent to the college selection process.
12. **college virtual tour**: allows a student to view college environment while on-line.
13. **community college**: sometimes called junior college, technical college, or city college, is primarily a two-year public institution providing higher education, granting certificates, diplomas, and associate's degrees.
14. **course of study**: group of courses students are required to take in order to earn a college degree; major.
15. **credit or credit hours**: points awarded for successful completion of high school or college courses; credit hours usually equal the number of hours a class meets per week.
16. **degree**: academic title given to students who have completed a course of study.
17. **doctoral degree**: the most advanced degree, awarded after three to five years of additional study following completion of a master's degree.

- 18. dual enrollment:** a student enrolled in high school is also enrolled at a local institution of higher learning, such as a community college or university. The student may take classes at either institution for credit toward their high school diploma, as well as for college credit.
- 19. Education and Career Action Plan (ECAP):** reflects a student's current plan of coursework, career aspirations, and extended learning opportunities in order to develop the student's individual academic and career goals.
- 20. essay:** short literary composition on a particular theme or subject.
- 21. FAFSA:** Free Application for Federal Student Aid
- 22. goals:** statements about what you intend to achieve.
- 23. Grade Point Average (G.P.A.):** the average of all grades received.
grant: giving of funds for a specific purpose; it does not have to be paid back.
- 24. honors course:** course that offers the same material as a regular class, but enriched with greater depth and a faster pace.
- 25. International Baccalaureate (IB):** three programmes of international education and rigorous assessment designed to help students aged 3-19 develop the intellectual, personal, emotional and social skills to live, learn and work in a rapidly globalizing world.
- 26. internship:** a job in a student's field of study; may be required in some academic programs and may include salary and college credit.
- 27. interview:** a formal meeting in person, especially one arranged for the assessment of the qualifications of an applicant.
- 28. job:** a regular activity performed in exchange for payment; a position in which someone is employed.
- 29. letter of recommendation:** a letter sent by someone that recommends a person with favorable statements concerning character, qualifications, or ability.
- 30. master's degree:** academic degree conferred by a college or university upon those who complete at least one year of prescribed study beyond the bachelor's degree.
- 31. PLAN:** pre-ACT test that helps 10th graders build a solid foundation for future academic and career success.
- 32. postsecondary education:** education beyond the high school level, especially education at the college or university level.
- 33. prerequisite:** a course or courses that must be successfully completed before a student can enroll in the next-level course or more advanced courses.
- 34. PSAT/NMSQT:** Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is offered mostly to juniors who want to practice for the SAT and perhaps qualify for scholarships.
- 35. SAT:** a standardized test for college admissions in the United States.
- 36. scholarship:** grant of financial aid awarded to a student, for the purpose of attending a college; it does not have to be paid back.
- 37. student loans:** money you borrow to pay for school; this money can be borrowed from both the federal and state governments as well as from the schools themselves and private sources (banks); mostly repay.
- 38. transcript:** the cumulative official record containing the courses, semester hours, and grades earned by a student.
- 39. university:** an institution for higher learning which contains a collection of colleges. When you go to a university you are going to be graduating from one of their colleges, such as the business college.
- 40. work-study:** an education plan in which students alternate between paid employment and formal study; money earned does not have to be paid back.
