Virtual Classroom Tips

As we are all online delivering content to students here are some tips to keep in mind that can be helpful going forward for the remainder of the school year.

- Strive for asynchronous—this helps with equity and students that lack access to technology.
- Less is more—This is an overwhelming time for everyone, narrow your focus to essential standards only and limit the screen time.
- Learning should be more concrete—Be clear and concise in your directions and be interactive.
- Break skills down—Scaffold, micro-target skills, and give feedback.
- Build a community—Encourage the use of chat and other means of communication with you.
- Reduce learning—Pare down your instruction to focus only on those activities that will enhance and lead to language acquisition.
- Reuse and Recycle—Take activities that worked during the school year and adapt them to use again online.
