Structuring Youth-Driven Space in the Dance/Theatre Classroom

Join Rising Youth Theatre's Teaching Artists Thameenah Muhammad and Carlos Lara in a reflection session and group brainstorm focused on creating and holding space that centers the whole human in arts & SEL learning. They will talk through their process for shifting their work online while still staying true to one of RYT's core values of centering youth. You'll learn skills and tools for structuring youth-driven space and have a chance to brainstorm how to bring them into your online, hybrid, and socially distant theatre and dance classroom spaces and beyond.

Rising Youth Theatre is a youth leadership organization in Phoenix that uses theatre to position young people in advocacy spaces. Rising Youth's mission is to imagine and build the world we want to live in through youth-driven, multigenerational collaboration and justice-centered artistic process and performance that generates reflection, connection and action. The company works with youth and professional adult artists to create multigenerational, socially relevant, original plays and processes, operating on a power-sharing, horizontal leadership model. The diverse young people in our ensemble are central to our decision-making process and organizational structure. Rising Youth Theatre believes that change happens when we listen to young people. There are very few spaces in our state where young people are positioned as leaders, working alongside adults to make a difference. Through artmaking, storytelling, and embodied research around issues that matter in our community, we are able to create opportunities for young people to advocate for themselves and their peers. Navigating a New Dance Education Landscape: Instructional Highlights

In this session, participants will hear highlights from a panel of three dance teachers on successful instructional strategies in classrooms in online, hybrid, or in-person instruction.



Jennifer Florey graduated from Hope College in 2012 with a Bachelor's of Arts degree in Dance Education. During her senior year at Hope, she completed her student teaching in the city of Chicago and went on to be assistant director of Auroris Dance Company in the Chicago suburbs. Upon graduation, she was awarded the Florence Cavanuagh Award for her strong technique and theory, and for showing promise in the field of dance education. During the summer of 2013 she accepted a teaching position at Kofa High School in Yuma, AZ directing the dance program. She is in her eighth year of teaching at Kofa and has traveled with her dancers to Hawaii for the Pearl Harbor Memorial Parade, San Diego for the Holiday Bowl Halftime Performance, and New York City. While in Hawaii, her team was awarded the Spirit Award for their positive attitude, enthusiasm, and hard work. Florey has also brought a number of guest teachers down to Yuma for her students to experience, including Stephanie Rankin, Steven lannacone, William Crowley, and Dustin and Sheraton Philips. Her dancers had the honor of

learning and performing lannacone's piece "Sur la Table" in spring 2018. Florey has been able to share her knowledge of dance education by leading sessions and presenting research at four National Dance Education Organization National Conferences, and has published an article in the Dance for Children International Newsletter. She recently completed her Masters of Arts in Dance Education from University of North Carolina at Greensboro in May of 2019. Florey currently holds the position of Treasurer for the Arizona Dance Education Organization, a chapter of NDEO, and is a Member at Large for the Dance and the Children International board.



Christine Rudy-Reed (MAT) is the Fine & Performing Arts School Specialist for the Department of Arts Education in Chicago Public Schools. There, she guides effective school implementation of Fine and Performing Arts curriculum, instruction, assessment and intervention through professional learning, continuous improvement strategic planning support, and program incubation and implementation support to the 70 Fine & Performing Arts Schools across the CPS district. She taught for 8 years at both public and charter schools, teaching dance, reading, and as a PreK teacher assistant, and built new dance programs from the ground up both in Ohio and Illinois. Christine has a passion for arts integration and loves combining the arts and other content areas to build connections for students. Christine is a founding board member and current Board Secretary of the Illinois Dance Education Organization; a long-standing

professional member, Development Committee member, and K-12 Teaching Mentor for the National Dance Education Organization; and an independent curriculum consultant and developer. Her most advanced degree is a Masters of Art in Teaching, with a focus in Elementary Education, from Columbia College Chicago. Christine is a modern and contemporary dancer, and enjoys taking class for her own continued practice, exploring movement improvisation, and attending dance performances across Chicago.



Tiffany White graduated from Virginia Commonwealth University with a BFA in Dance and Choreography and BS in Creative Advertising. She taught Dance at several private and performing arts schools while dancing professionally in Washington D.C. before moving out to Arizona. Tiffany earned her Master's in Secondary Education from University of Arizona in 2015 and most recently, her Master's in Counseling from Prescott College in 2019. She was a member of the Arizona Department of Education's Standards Revision Committee in 2015 and the Student Learning Objectives Committee in 2017. Tiffany has advocated for Dance Education at AZ Arts Congress, has served as a Grant Panelist for the Arizona Commission of the Arts, a member of the Mesa Arts Center Dance Café (a group that was tasked at helping to revitalize the Dance community in Mesa),

and a member of the NCAAS Model Cornerstone Assessments Pilot Team. She is currently the President Elect of Arizona Dance Educator's Organization (AzDEO). In 2019, Tiffany was awarded the Kathy Lindholm Lane Dance Educator of the Year and was recognized at a Gilbert Public Schools board meeting for outstanding work. Tiffany has taught at several high schools in the East Valley, but is currently directing the Dance department at Chandler High School.

Navigating a New Theatre Education Landscape: Instructional Highlights

In this session, participants will engage in an interactive workshop on successful instructional strategies specifically for theatre teachers navigating online, hybrid, and in-person instruction. Participants will gain knowledge and experience with how to utilize the various worlds of engagement on Zoom and other virtual learning platforms and learn tips to apply strategies across the synchronous-to-asynchronous spectrum of modalities. **We also welcome teachers from any discipline who wants to develop strategies for interactive, engaged, and embodied learning**.



Kristina Friedgen is a director/choreographer, theatre deviser, and educator who seeks to create theatrical experiences that connect the community and promote social action. Currently, as an MFA candidate in ASU's Theatre for Youth & Communities program, her research explores how to create participatory and immersive theatre through digital performance in order to foster a relationship between the audience and the performer. In addition to her graduate work, Kristina is the Education Director at Young Artists of America, a youth-focused musical theatre training company for singers, actors, dancers, and musicians in Washington, D.C. She worked as a theatre educator for the past 13 years after earning her BA in Theatre from the University of Maryland and a Certificate in Teaching from Notre Dame of Maryland.



Dr. Mary McAvoy is an associate professor of theatre education and theatre for youth at Arizona State University where she directs theatre teacher preparation programs. Her research and creative practice focuses on histories of theatre and drama in educational contexts; educational theatre/drama; teaching artistry; performance with, by, and for young people; and performance pedagogy and activism. She is the co-author of *Drama and Education:* Performance Methodologies for Teaching and Learning (Routledge), author of Rehearsing Revolutions: The Labor Drama Experiment and Radical Activism in the Early Twentieth Century, and co-editor of Youth and Performance: Perceptions of the Contemporary Child (OLMS) and the forthcoming "Routledge Companion to Drama in Education." Her articles have appeared in Youth Theatre Journal, The Journal of American Drama and Theatre, Arts Education Policy Review, and various edited collections. She is a former K12 theatre educator and has

worked extensively in education and community engagement for performance and theatre. She has presented master classes and professional development in theatre teaching and theatre arts curriculum development in the US, Russia, and China and has developed engagement programs for a variety of audiences in professional and educational theatres.



Navigating a New Music Education Landscape: Instructional Highlights

In this session, participants will hear highlights from a panel of three music teachers on successful instructional strategies in classrooms in online, hybrid, or in-person instruction.



Efrain Casillas, the Coordinator of Music Programs for the Tolleson Elementary School District (TESD) in Tolleson, Arizona, has had a tremendous impact on his students. He has been a public-school music teacher for 21 years and is currently working for the Tolleson Elementary School District, teaching both general and instrumental music at two district schools.

He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in Music Performance and Education degree from Western Connecticut State University in 1999. While wearing both a classroom teacher and Department Coordinator hat at TESD, he has created and implemented the district's first Mariachi, Jazz, Marching, Concert and Latin Jazz bands on two school campuses. The Tolleson Elementary School Mariachi band has competed at the Tucson Mariachi International Conference and won 1st and 2nd place for the Choice Awards for 3 years in a row. They have also performed at

Disneyland and participated in the Disney Land Parade. His middle school Latin Jazz band opened for Pete Escobedo and played alongside his band throughout their performance. The Tolleson Elementary School Marching band participated in the Fiesta Bowl Parade for 3 consecutive years.

In 2015, Casillas was selected for as TESD's Teacher of the Year and nominated for the Life Changer of the Year Award in 2017. He was selected to receive the Esperanza Award from Chicanos Por La Causa in 2018, and the Music Teachers of Excellence from the Country Music Foundation (CMF) in 2020. His versatility and dedication as a music teacher also had him featured at the Kelly Clarkson Show in 2020.



Grammy nominated music educator **Steve Holley** served as the Producer for the Commercial Music Program at the Kent Denver School outside Denver, CO, for 19 years. During his tenure the R&B, soul, salsa, and jazz bands of the CMP were recognized by DownBeat magazine's Student Music Awards 15 times. The bands performed hundreds of gigs in the U.S. and abroad, held standing gigs at local clubs, performed on dozens of radio and television broadcasts, recorded at some of the most hallowed studios in the country, and performed with dozens of Grammy caliber artists. He is a sought-after bassist and clinician with performances, master classes, and presentations given at dozens of state, national, and international conferences. Holley has written numerous articles for the National Association of Music Education, the Association for Popular Music Education, and the Jazz Education Network. Holley authored the book Coaching a Popular Music Ensemble: Blending formal, non-formal, and informal approaches in the rehearsal and is currently co-editing his second

book on action-based popular music pedagogies. Currently, he serves on the executive board of the Association for Popular Music Education is pursuing his Ph.D. in Music Learning and Teaching at Arizona State University.



Viewed as a creative leader, **Nathan Johnston** demonstrates the ability to foster artistic expressions from both novice and accomplished members alike. He focuses on the opportunities for "creative education", blending traditional and progressive approaches in the same classroom or community space. He has served a variety of classroom and Administrator roles throughout the East Valley (ASU, Chandler, Queen Creek, Scottsdale, and Tempe). As a contemporary educator, Johnston champions the integration of modern technology and mobile applications to enhance individual and community musicking opportunities. Striving to emphasize that diligent practice and hard work can be relevant and rewarding, Johnston remains cognizant of emerging educational techniques, keeping the creating and sharing process engaging for all participants. He serves on a variety of committees representing Arts Education throughout Arizona, including Co-Chairing the Round Table Advisory Committee (RTAC).

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

It's Not Failure if You Learn Something: Using Visual Art to Promote a Growth Mindset

In this interactive discussion with Natalie Marsh, director of learning and innovation, and Brittany Arnold, teen and family coordinator, for Scottsdale Arts, you will explore how visual arts connect to social emotional learning (SEL) competencies. By exploring impactful aspects from existing programs and by using Scottsdale Museum of Contemporary Art's collection, you will leave this session with practical yet creative ideas that you can immediately implement into any classroom to inspire a growth mindset in your students. For this session, you will need to be prepared to look at art and use digital engagement tools to participate in a discussion that will hopefully inspire you to use visual art to embrace a "fail forward" mentality.



Natalie Marsh is currently the Director of Learning & Innovation at Scottsdale Arts. As a passionate arts advocate and educator, working for the organization combines her experience and enthusiasm for building vibrant, healthy communities through opportunities that connect diverse audiences to arts and culture. Marsh received her MA in Museum Studies from Johns Hopkins University with a focus on digital engagement and her BFA and K-12 education certificate from the University of Michigan and Eastern Michigan University.
