

HLP: 18

Use strategies to promote active student engagement.

Teachers use a variety of instructional strategies that result in active student responding. Active student engagement is critical to academic success.

Teachers must initially build relationships to foster engagement and motivate reluctant learners.

HLP: 18 (slide 2)

They promote engagement by connecting learning to students' lives (e.g., knowing students' academic and cultural backgrounds) and using a variety of teacherled (e.g., choral responding and response cards), peer-assisted (e.g., cooperative learning and peer tutoring), student-regulated (e.g., self-management), and technology-supported stategies shown empirically to increase student engagement.

They monitor student engagement and provide positive and constructive feedback to sustain performance.

Learning Success Coach

- Full-time professional educators that serve as school counselors, academic advisors, college and career advisors, emotional support counselors, and academic coaches.
- Each student is assigned an LSC
- The LSC monitors student progress daily, acting as a liaison between instructional staff and families.
- They provide a holistic perspective of the student's overall course load and support learners with course planning, college applications, and more.



Schedule of the Week and Engagement Expectation

- 2 week Orientation to be a Digital Learner
- Elementary <u>ASU prep digital elementary</u>
 - Small groups designed around students classroom schedule
- Middle <u>ASU prep digital middle school</u>
 - Small groups designed around needs
 - Push in to live lessons
- High School ASU prep digital a day in the life
 - 1:1 sessions designed around each individual student and their pace
 - Push in to live lessons

Evaluations and Related Services

Evaluations

- Confidential platform for completing testing and storing data
- Testing can be done in person at our campuses or done virtually
- Evaluation tools are chosen based on those which have been normed in a digital format or consideration of scores reported without a digital norm.

Related services

- Teletherapy norms and strategies
- Speech/OT/counseling all completed in a virtual setting with camera to enable the provider to see the student while working together
- 1:1 for most services
- Small group for social needs, students grouped depending on their needs
