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THE IMPACT



SCHOOLHOUSE CONNECTION LIAISON SURVEY

- Estimated 420,000 fewer children and youth experiencing homelessness were identified and enrolled by schools in Fall 2020 compared to Fall 2019 = 28%
- The primary reason (69.7%) cited "Inability to identify families/youth due to distance learning/school building closure" as the reason for lower enrollment.
- Only 18% of respondents indicated that federal coronavirus relief education funding provided by CARES Act was being used to meet the needs of students experiencing homelessness.
- Research was referenced in the bipartisan amendment to the American Rescue Plan Act.

NATIONAL DATA


Pre-Pandemic

- 2018-2019 SY: 1,387,573 students identified experiencing homelessness
- 67.8% student experiencing homelessness graduated high school
- 36.8% of students experiencing homelessness were chronically absent

Pandemic

- Dept. of Ed. predicts 2020-2021 SY data to demonstrate a decrease of 30%
- An increase in child and family homelessness due to the economic impact of the pandemic
- Office of Head Start reported that children experiencing homelessness in Head Start and Early Head Start decreased by 23% from 2019-2021
- Chronic absenteeism rates were much higher for students experiencing homelessness than for other subgroups
- More than 167,000 children –roughly 1 in 450 of all children in US – have lost at least one of their caretakers to COVID (Dec.2021)

LASTING IMPLICATIONS

- Homeless education programs have learned that proactive identification and support for children and youth experiencing homelessness is essential to pandemic recovery.
- Research has found that the lack of a high school diploma or GED is the single greatest risk factor for homelessness as a young adult.

ARP-HCY FUNDS

Purpose of ARP-HCY Funds

 Increase state-wide capacity to address the impact of the pandemic on the <u>identification</u>, <u>enrollment</u>, <u>retention</u>, and <u>educational success</u> of children and youth experiencing homelessness

Arizona's Total ARP-HCY Funding: \$16,914,124

- ARP Homeless I Grant
- ARP Homeless I Mini-Grant
- ARP Homeless II Entitlement Grant

ARP Homeless II – Entitlement Grant Funds: \$9,520,398


ALLOCATION FORMULA

SEA must award ARP Homeless II – Entitlement subgrants to each LEA according to the following formula:

50% in proportion to the amount that the LEA received under Title 1, Part A for fiscal year FY21, and

50% in proportion to the number of homeless children and youth identified by the LEA, using the greater number of the homeless children and youth in either SY18-19 or SY19-20.

ALLOCATION BREAKDOWN



CONSORTIUM REQUIREMENTS

LEAs or Charters with less than \$5000 allocation must form consortia to access their funds

- There is no limit to the number of LEAs that can join a consortium.
- There is no limit to the number of consortia that receive subgrants.
- Each consortium must have a combined allocation of at least \$5,000 among all participating LEAs.
- MOUs must be in place between the consortium lead and the consortium members.

- Title I, Part A set-aside

ALLOWABLE USES

- All 16 allowable expenses as permitted by the McKinney-Vento Act
- Additional ARP-HCY allowable expenditures
- Ensure that all costs are *reasonable and necessary*
- Uses of funds align with the purpose of the McKinney-Vento Act/EHCY grant
