

Strategies

- 3.3 Support and promote recruitment and retention of school counselors, school psychologists, and school social workers.



Comprehensive School Wellness

Improving Student Health and Academic Achievement Through Nutrition, Physical Activity, and the Management of Chronic Conditions in Schools (CDC 1801)

SSP promotes, supports and enhances safe and effective learning environments for all students on school campuses in Arizona by:

- Providing funding and comprehensive training for SW/SC/SRO/JPOs and their administrative teams
- Building systems of sustainability for school safety
 - Helping AZ reimagine school safety
