What is the McKinney Vento Act?

- Federal education law, originally passed in 1987
 - Reauthorized in 2015 by Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)
 - Amendments took effect October 1, 2016.

• Works hand-in-hand with Title I Part A

- A child or youth who is homeless and is attending any school in the district is automatically eligible for Title I services. [1115(b)(2)(E)]
- This includes support services and supplemental educational programs such as tutoring, summer school, preschool, etc. and other federal education programs such as Free & Reduced Breakfast/Lunch program.

Key Provisions of the McKinney-Vento Act

- Immediate enrollment, even without documents
 - Unaccompanied youth = immediate enrollment
- School stability
 - Transportation to school of origin
- Eliminate barriers = ensure school policies and procedures are fair
- Dispute Resolution Process
- District Liaison assigned to every school district



Legal Definition of Homelessness



Fixed: Stationary, permanent, not subject to change



Regular: Used on a predictable, routine, consistent basis



Adequate: Lawfully and reasonably sufficient. Is it sufficient for meeting the physical and psychological needs typically met in a home environment

Common Qualifying Living Situations

| Sheltered | Shelters Transitional housing programs |
|---------------|--|
| Unsheltered | Abandoned buildings Campgrounds, parks, vehicles Inadequate housing structures or trailer parks |
| Hotel / Motel | • Temporary housing in hotel or motel |
| Doubled-Up | Sharing housing with friends or family due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason. Typically not of mutual interest. |
| Unaccompanied | A homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. This includes when a student is with a family member, but that person is not their legal guardian. |

Common Obstacles Faced by Homeless Youth

- Unable to meet standard school enrollment requirements;
- Move around and change schools often;
- Experience hunger, tiredness, and stress;
- Lack school supplies or completed homework (lack of space or resources);
- Lack access to reliable transportation; and/or
- Do not have a parent or guardian to help them (unaccompanied youth).



Responsibilities of the LEA

In general, each LEA must:

- Ensure access to education,
- Connect families with services,
- Form collaborations with CBOs, and
- Inform and provide learning for all stakeholders.

Ensure a student's education may continue at their school of origin,

Enroll students in the same school a non-homeless student would be enrolled in,

Comply with school stability protocol,

Assist families in attaining enrollment forms and records if needed,

Manage any disputes,

Uphold student and family privacy,

Provide comparable services and education to homeless students,

Coordinate with local social service agencies, and

Align with the Arizona State Plan.



Responsibilities of the McKinney-Vento Liaison

- 1. Homeless youth are *identified* through outreach with other agencies;
- 2. Homeless youth are *enrolled* in and have full and equal opportunity to succeed in school;
- 3. Access to federally required resources: HeadStart and other *preschool* programs, interventions under IDEA, etc.;
- 4. **Referral to well-being services**: health care, dental, mental health, substance abuse, housing, etc.;
- 5. **Inform** families and youth of **educational opportunities** with meaningful opportunities to participate;

- 6. Provide understandable *public notice of educational rights* in locations frequented by homeless youth, guardians, and unaccompanied youth: schools, shelters, public libraries, soup kitchens;
- 7. Mediate enrollment *disputes* according to federal guidance;
- 8. Inform family and youth of all *transportation* services;
- 9. Provide *professional development* and support for all stakeholders who serve homeless students; and
- 10. Assist *unaccompanied youth* with: enrollment, academic access and success, and notification of "Independent" status and assistance for FAFSA.



Early Childhood Referrals and Homeless Identifications

LEA Liaisons ensure that:

homeless families and homeless children and youths have **access to** and **receive educational services** for which such families, children, and youths are eligible, including services through

- HeadStart programs (including Early HeadStart programs),
- early intervention services under part C of IDEA, and
 - LEA administered preschool programs.



Identifying Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

The term **unaccompanied youth** includes a homeless child or youth **not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian**.

An unaccompanied homeless youth is a young person who is both **homeless** (meeting McKinney-Vento definition) **and unaccompanied** (not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian).

DCS is **not involved** in any way with the child/youth.



Scenario - Question

Michael is currently living with his aunt and uncle. His parents are attending graduate school in Europe. Michael wanted to finish his Senior year at his current high school so, he asked to stay with his aunt and uncle. His aunt and uncle don't have legal guardianship.

Lisa is currently living with her aunt because her parents were recently incarcerated and are facing deportation. Her aunt does not have legal guardianship.

Scenario - Answer

Which student would be considered homeless and an unaccompanied youth?

Michael is **NOT** considered homeless, due to the fact he did not experience a loss of housing. Michael had fixed, regular and adequate housing. However, there was planned living arrangement established.

Lisa **IS** considered homeless, since her parents were suddenly incarcerated, causing her to experience a loss of housing.



Requirements of Arizona McKinney-Vento Liaisons

According to <u>Arizona's ESSA State Plan</u>, McKinney-Vento Liaisons must:



- Collaborate with school personnel to ensure use of the **Student Residency Questionnaire** and **Unaccompanied Youth Caregiver's Authorization Form** to identify homeless students;
 - **Utilize the Best Interest Determination (BID)** Form to make school enrollment decisions when necessary,
- Assess the needs presented by the students through **locally developed informal needs assessment** tools;
- Ensure required student data elements for homeless students and youth are accurately submitted to ADE;
- Provide at minimum an **annual training** to all LEA school staff including administrative staff; and
- Annually **develop, review, and revise policies** to increase access to educational opportunities and academic success.

THE MCKINNEY-VENTO ACT: HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH

PROGRAM

The mission of the Homeless Education Program is to ensure positive comparable academic outcomes for children and youth experiencing homelessness through implementation of the McKinney-Vento statute.

Homeless students are those who lack a fixed, regular, adequate nighttime residence. This includes students who are sharing the housing of other persons due to a loss of housing, economic harship or similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks or campgrounds due to lack of alternative adequate accomodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals. The definition includes migratory students who live in the aforementioned situations. Beginning December 10th, 2016, "those awaiting foster care placement" are not included in the definition.



ADE Homeless Education Program Newsletter & Updates

Every school district and charter school must appoint a McKinney-Vento Liaison and submit their contact information to the state department.

- Access the sign-up sheet on the Homeless Education Program (HEP) website.
- Stay up-to-date on requirements and important information from the state department.
- McKinney-Vento Liaison contact information will be updated on the McKinney-Vento Liaison Contact Sheet on the HEP website, a useful tool in connecting parents, school staff, and McKinney-Vento Liaisons.



Student Residency Questionnaire

- To ensure identification and enrollment of homeless students, LEAs must have a procedure in place to identify students who may be experiencing homelessness.
- ADE provides this Student Housing Questionnaire template to aide in identifying students at the time of enrollment.

Unaccompanied Youth Caregiver's Authorization Affidavit

The McKinney-Vento Act includes the following provisions specific to unaccompanied youth:

- The right to immediate enrollment without proof of quardianship;
- Assistance from the local homeless education liaison (hereafter local liaison) to select a school of attendance, whether the local attendance area school or the school of origin;
- Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if requested; and
- Ensure the prompt and fair resolution of any disputes in accordance with the Act (see the Disputes under the McKinney-Vento Act sidebar for more information)

McKinney-Vento Act Interest Determination for School Placement

Homeless Education Program

The McKinney-Vento Act requires school districts to consider the school of origin as the first option in school enrollment. Parents may choose the school of origin or the school in the residency the area where the child(ren) currently live (school of residency may also be referred to as local area attendance school), individuals who may be consulted when determining what placement is in the child(ren)'s best interest include the following:

- child(ren) or youth experiencing homelessness,
- parent, guardian, or caregiver of the child(ren) or youth
 district/charter homeless liaison.
- district/charter homeless liaison,
 school site personnel (e.g. counselor, social worker, SPED teacher, etc), and
- school site personnel (e.g. cl homeless shelter personnel.

It is the school district's responsibility to determine the school of origin and residency, and to resolve any conflict concerning the school placement by focusing on the best interest of the child(reh). Whenever possible, the school district school domply with the wishes of the parent, guardian, caregiver, or unaccompanied homeless youth. If the school district and parent, guardian, caregiver, or unaccompanied homeless youth do not agree on the appropriate placement, the school district's Dispute Resolution Procedure must be followed. In such cases, the child(rein should be enrolled in the school that the parent, guardian, caregiver, or unaccompanied homeless youth has chosen until the conclusion of the resolution process. If the school of origin is determined to be the best placement, the local homeless education liaions both school of origin and local attendance area school must work together to arrange transportation.

Best Interest Determination Form

The McKinney-Vento Act requires school districts to consider the school of origin as the first option in school enrollment. Parents may choose the school of origin or the school in the residency the area where the child(ren) currently live (school of residency may also be referred to as local area attendance school).

Individuals who may be consulted when determining what placement is in the child(ren)'s best interest include the following:

- child(ren) or youth experiencing homelessness;
- parent, guardian, or caregiver of the child(ren) or youth;
- district/charter homeless liaison;
- school site personnel (e.g. counselor, social worker, SPED teacher, etc); and/or
- homeless shelter personnel.



Your school-age children may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney-Vento Act.

Your eligible children have the right to:

- · Receive a free, appropriate public education.
- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment.
- · Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents.
- Enroll in the local school; or continue attending their school of origin (the school they attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is your preference.
 - * If the school district believes that the school you select is not in the best interest of your children, then the district must provide you with a written explanation of its position and inform you of your right to appeal its decision.
- · Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
- Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your children's needs.

If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age children.






Arizona's Homeless Student Enrollment Data

Data Collection

A local educational agency may receive a subgrant under this part for any fiscal year only if such agency has on file with the State educational agency a plan, approved by the State educational agency, that... is coordinated with... the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act [20 U.S.C. § 6312(a)(1)(B)].

- We recommend administering a yearly assessment to gather data from school personnel, parents, youth served, and community-based agencies.
- Data should always be utilized to drive future decision making for the purpose of requesting subgrant funding. This allows LEAs to make decisions on how to provide comparable services to homeless youth.



Grants

Through the EHCY program, the U.S. Department of Education (USDE) provides an annual grant award to State Education Agencies (SEAs) to then subgrant to Local Education Agencies (LEAs). The purpose of the EHCY subgrant funds is to **supplement** the services provided to all students to **eliminate the specific barriers** to the identification, enrollment, attendance, and academic success of children and youth experiencing homeness (42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(4)).

Current Grants:

- EHCY Competitive (three-year cycle)
- ARP I and II Grants (one-time, already disbursed)
- Consortium Grants (EHCY and ARP Grants)
