Premier Speakers:

Carol Kosnitsky

Carol Kosnitsky is the nationally recognized and popular author of <u>IEP</u> <u>Goals That Make a Difference: An Administrator's Guide to Improving</u> <u>the Process</u> (2018, LRP Publications). This book is used widely by teachers as well as administrators. As a distinguished special education consultant with more than 35 years in the field, Carol provides consultation and professional development services across the country, traveling from her home base in New England.



Her work focuses on improving outcomes for students with disabilities through increased access to the general education curriculum.

She is particularly sought after for her expertise regarding the development of relevant and measurable IEPs, the aligning of IEPs with the Common Core, and the collaboration between general and special education to improve education for all students. Ms. Kosnitsky was a special education director for 20 years in New Hampshire, served as President of the New Hampshire Association for Special Education Administrators, and developed the New Hampshire Academy for Special Education Directors.

Mike Marotta

Mike is a RESNA Certified Assistive Technology Professional and the 2017 ISTE Inclusive Learning Network Outstanding Educator. Mike is a nationally and internationally recognized presenter providing practical training to professionals interested in assistive and inclusive technology. In addition, Mike is an adjunct professor at Ramapo College of New Jersey (NJ) teaching Master's-level educators in Assistive Technology and Universal Design for Learning.



Mike is the Director of the Richard West Assistive Technology Advocacy Center and serves on both the CAST Accessible Educational Materials and Center on Inclusive Technology and Education Systems (CITES) Advisory Boards. Mike is also the founder of EdcampAccess NJ and co-moderator of the weekly #ATchat Twitter chat. Dr. Joan Kester

Dr. Joan Kester, is an Assistant Professor of Special Education and Disability Studies at the George Washington University, Graduate School of Education and Human Development. She is the Program Director of the Interdisciplinary Secondary Transition Program, where scholars from across the country learn evidence-based secondary transition practices and become leaders in the field. Her primary research has been through action research, where youth, families, and stakeholders are engaged in action planning to improve transition



practices. As a result of this research, her team is now implementing the <u>Transition Discoveries</u> framework and action planning process across Pennsylvania. She is the PI of the Transition Quality Empowerment Project, funded by the PA Development Disabilities Council. The purpose of this project is to collaborate with schools and communities in a rural, urban, and suburban area to evaluate and improve transition practices. Through this work, innovative practices to provide the tools and resources for youth, families, and transition stakeholders to engage in communities to identify and expand opportunities for youth and families to learn and grow. Joan receives national recognition for her work in the successful transition of youth with disabilities.

Michael Stoehr

Michael Stoehr, M.S., is a Knowledge Development and Technical Assistance Specialist with the <u>National Technical Assistance Center on</u> <u>Transition: the Collaborative (NTACT:C)</u>, the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. Erin Black


