Stay in your Home Community

PITAS Scholars will earn either a bachelor's or master's degree in Elementary Education and be eligible for Arizona State teaching certification in two years, while you stay in your home community and continue working in your school.

- Cumulative GPA of 2.5
- Agree to be a teacher in an Arizona Native-serving school upon graduation

Benefits to participants include:

- All tuition and fees covered if participant applies for ATA funding
- \$800 stipend each semester
- Laptop
- Coursework that is tailored to Native-serving schools and culturally responsive approaches to teaching and learning
- Mentorship and support from dedicated staff and cohort peers

Arizona Teachers Academy



 PITAS scholars receive a small stipend and laptop. As an admitted student in the **BSED/MED** Elementary Education program, you are eligible to participate in the **Arizona Teachers Academy** (ATA) which will cover your tuition and mandatory fees after all other scholarships and gift aid are applied.

Complete the FAFSA Yearly

(Federal Application for Federal Student Aid)



To receive this funding, you must:

- complete a FAFSA every year,
- seek ATA support, and
- remain in good academic standing at NAU.

You must commit to Teaching in Arizona



As a result of receiving the ATA and PITAS funding, our scholars commit to teaching at an approved Arizona public, Arizona BIE, or Arizona Charter school for the number of years you receive the funding.

Eligibility criteria: Bachelor's Degree

Individuals working as Para-Professionals, Educational Assistants, etc. in **schools on or bordering any of Arizona's 22 Native Nations** are eligible if they have the following:

- 45 units of coursework
- ENG 105 or equivalent
- MAT 150 or equivalent
- MAT 155 or equivalent
- 2 lab science courses
- EDF 200 or equivalent
- Cumulative GPA of 2.5
- Fingerprint clearance card



Eligibility criteria: Master's Degree

Individuals working as Para-Professionals, Educational Assistants, etc. in **schools on or bordering any of Arizona's 22 Native Nations** are eligible if they have the following:

- A completed bachelor's degree from an accredited institution.
 - GPA of 3.0 = full admittance
 - Below 3.0 undergraduate gpa must petition the College of Education Admissions Committee to achieve conditional admittance with allowance to achieve 3.0 in graduate-level work with first nine (9) graduate credit hours
- College Algebra or equivalent with a minimum grade of C
- ENG foundation composition course(s) with a minimum cumulative English GPA of 3.0
 - If the English composition GPA is not 3.0, the applicant can complete one of the following NAU courses (or an advisor approved writing course) with a minimum grade of B: ENG 105, ENG 205, 210, 211, 220, 270, 302W or 310W.
- One lab science with a minimum grade of C
- A copy of IVP fingerprint clearance card



Benefits of program participation



- The program is designed for para-professionals and others working in Native-serving schools
- PITAS Scholars will remain in your community while completing your courses synchronously online (via Zoom)
- PITAS Scholars are eligible to apply for ATA funding, which covers tuition and mandatory fees after all other scholarships and gift aid are applied
- PITAS Scholars will receive a laptop and an \$800 stipend each semester
- All education classes will be taken with the cohort, and classes will be designed for relevance to teaching in Arizona's Native-serving schools
- Faculty and staff will provide mentorship and support

Student Teaching

Working with schools in their communities, **PITAS scholars have** the opportunity to complete their student teaching requirements in those same communities.

Teaching in Indigenous Communities (THC) Certificate Developed by the College of Education and Applied Indigenous Studies

Starting Fall 2023

Are you interested in teaching in and partnering with Indigenous communities?

If you are interested developing understandings around reciprocity, cultural responsiveness, and building meaningful relationships with and in Native communities, the Teaching in Indigenous Communities (TIIC) certificate is for you! This program is open to all undergraduate students. regardless of your degree plan. The TIIC certificate requires 18 credit hours of specialized coursework. Most of this coursework is already required of students in the Elementary Education, Special Elementary Education, and Special Early Childhood Education programs, making the TIIC certificate a nearly seamless addition to these programs.

Students completing the Teaching in Indigenous Communities (TIIC) certificate will:

- Understand the history of American Indian education in the U.S.
- Know and be able to apply core concepts of Indigenous education including the importance of reciprocity and community.
- Recognize the unique assets of Indigenous schools and consider how to center those assets in teaching and learning approaches.

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*In year 4 you may choose to take either the fall or spring course, as required by your major.
