- Required by Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

Tribal Collaboration

- Builds culturally responsive relationships between Tribes and education entities

Consider...

What comes to mind when you hear the term consultation?

 **con·sult**
/kən'səlt/
verb

seek information or advice from (someone with expertise in a particular area).
"you should consult a financial advisor"

Similar: ask seek advice/information from take counsel from call on/upon/in

noun **NORTH AMERICAN**

an act of consulting a professional; a consultation.
"after a consult with his attorneys, he retracted his previous statement"

- Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965
- Latest authorization

ESSA

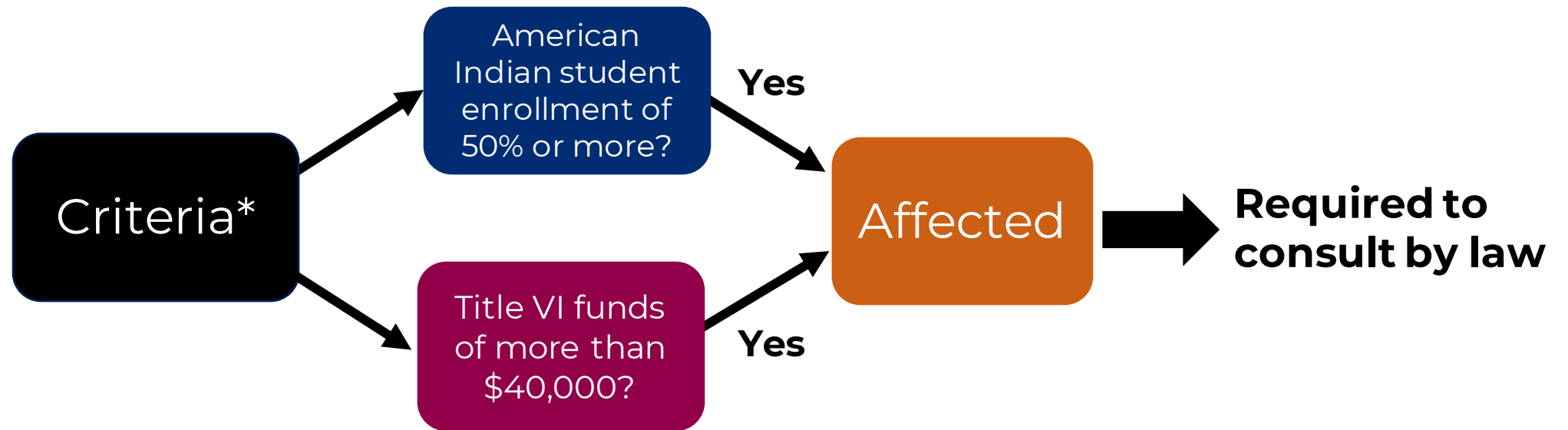
- Every Student Succeeds Act, Public Law 114-95, 2015
- Replaced No Child Left Behind

Sec 8538

- Selected school districts (defined as “affected”)
- Certain Federal Grants (defined as “covered”)

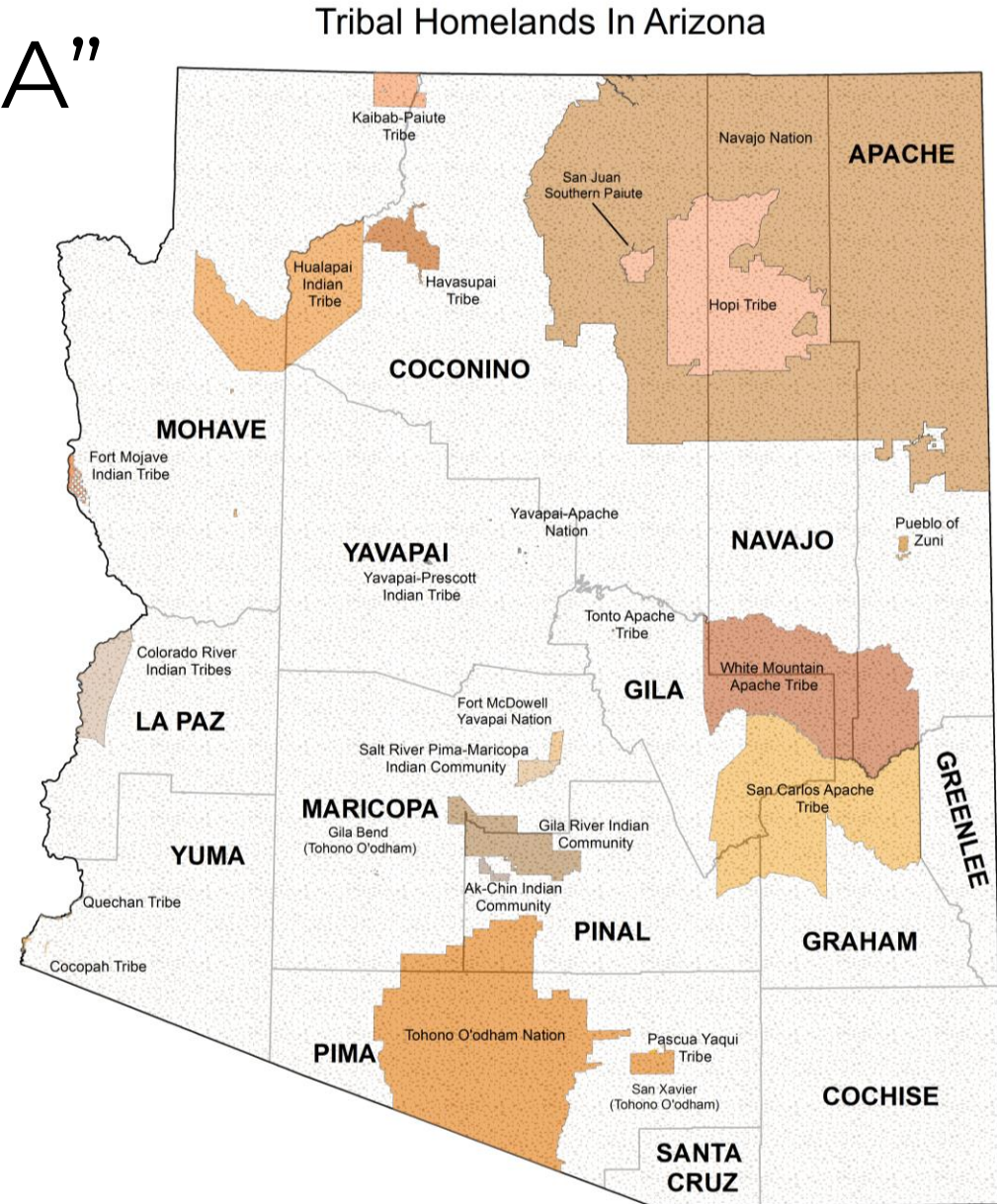

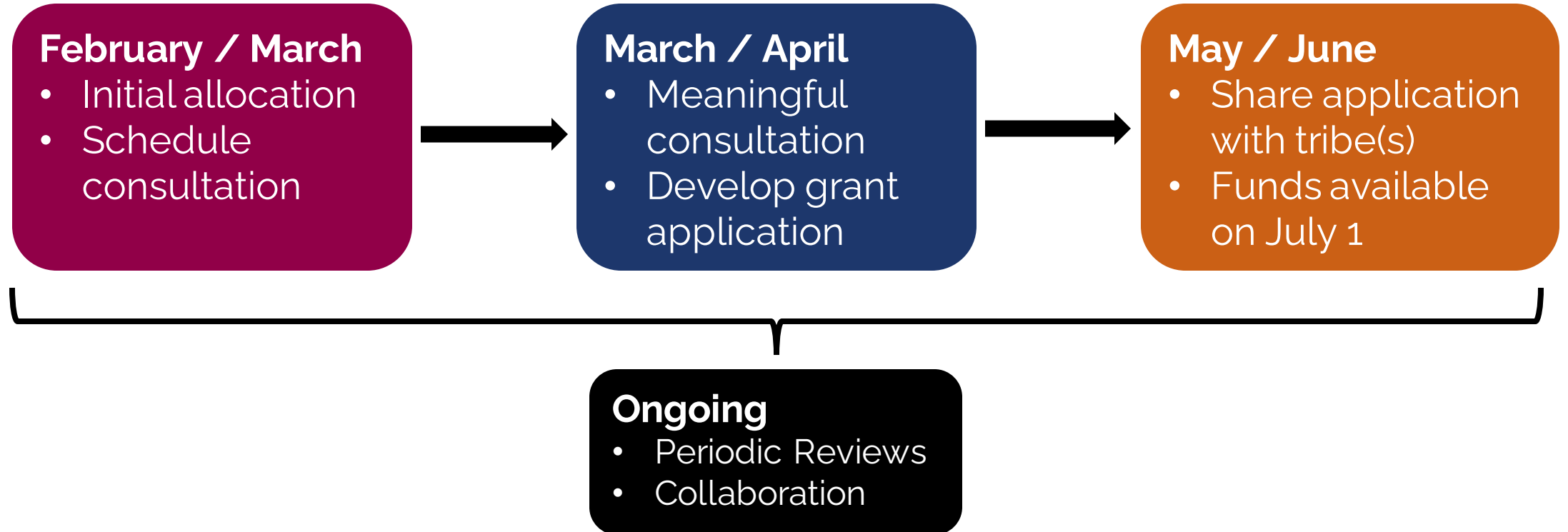

Benefits of Tribal Consultation

- Elevating tribal sovereignty and voices
- Shared responsibility and accountability for positive student outcomes
- Resources (academic, cultural, funding)

Collaboration

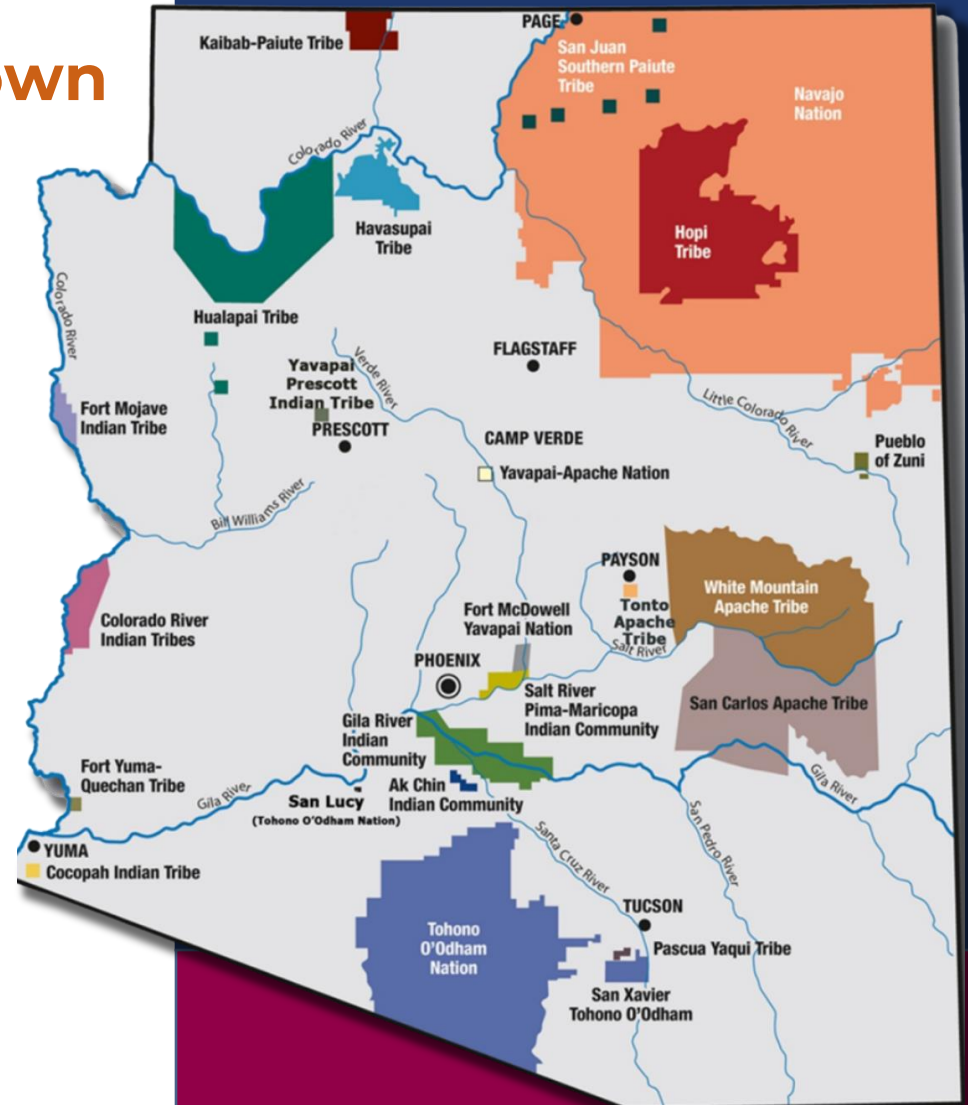
Tribal Nations in Arizona

Each Tribe is a sovereign nation with its own

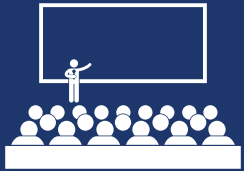
- Government system
- Language, cultural practices, education needs
- Government-to-government relationship with federal, state, and local entities

Tribal Education Department (TED)

- Tribe's education *expert*
- Assists with nutrition, safety, family, etc.



Opportunities for Collaboration



- Professional Learning and Development
 - Learning from Tribal Education and Culture Experts



- Culturally Responsive Curriculum
 - Incorporating local tribal history and current events



- Place-based Learning
 - Inviting elders and community members
 - Field trips to local places of meaning



- Family and Community Engagement Indicatives
 - Co-sponsoring family literacy nights
 - Including tribal representation at resource fairs, etc.

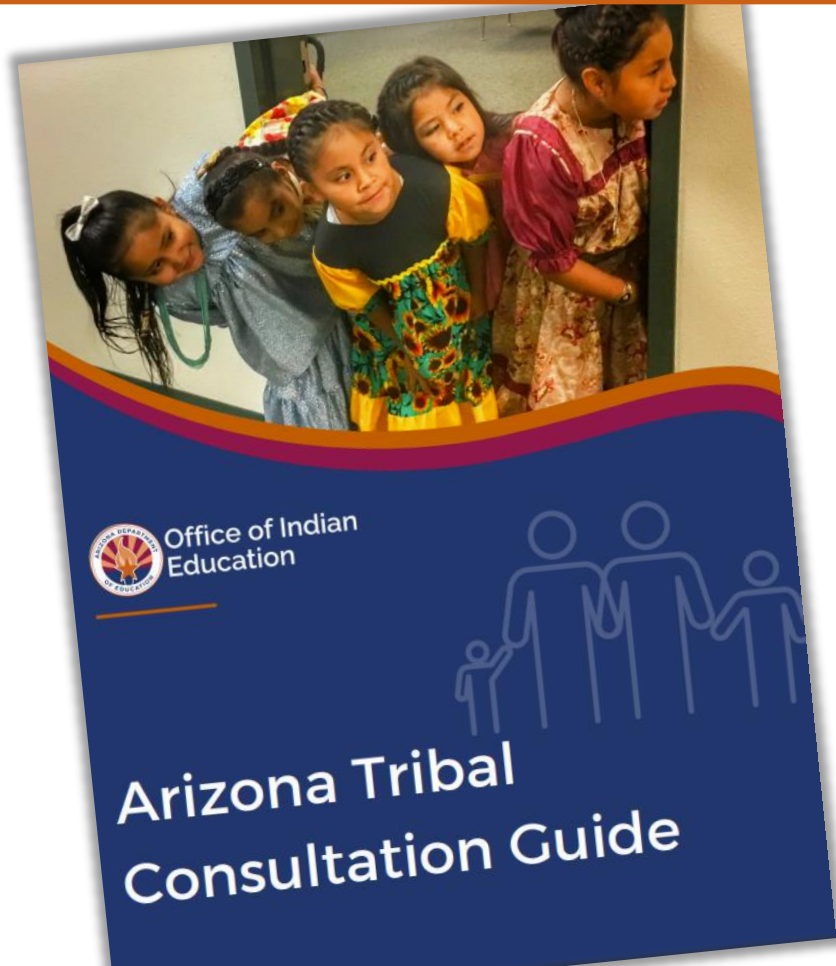
