
 Required by Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

- Replaced No Child Left Behind


Sec 8538






Suggested Consultation Timeline

Benefits of Tribal Consultation

- → Elevating tribal sovereignty and voices
- Shared responsibility and accountability for positive student outcomes
- → Resources (academic, cultural, funding)

Collaboration


Tribal Nations in Arizona

Each Tribe is a sovereign nation with its own

- Government system
- Language, cultural practices, education needs
- Government-to-government relationship with federal, state, and local entities

Tribal Education Department (TED)

- Tribe's education expert
- · Assists with nutrition, safety, family, etc.



Opportunities for Collaboration



- Professional Learning and Development
 - Learning from Tribal Education and Culture Experts



- Culturally Responsive Curriculum
 - Incorporating local tribal history and current events



- Place-based Learning
 - Inviting elders and community members
 - Field trips to local places of meaning
- Family and Community Engagement Indicatives




- Co-sponsoring family literacy nights
 Including tribal representation at resource fairs, etc.
