Overview



Summer Meal Service Programs

- Seamless Summer Option (SSO) offered by schools
- Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) offered by schools and community organizations
 - Non Congregate Feeding (offsite) option for eligible sites
- Extended School Lunch and Breakfast (NSLP/SBP)

Additional Summer Meal Assistance for Children

SUN Bucks, or the Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer Program (S-EBT) adds an additional supplement to the summer meals programs by providing grocery-buying benefits to low-income families with school-aged children when schools are closed for the summer. Notably, families can benefit from SUN Bucks alongside other programs like SNAP, WIC, and the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)/Seamless Summer Option (SSO).

Applying for the SFSP

Guidance: HNS 02-2025: Application for Summer Programs



APPLICATION PROCESS

SFAs and new or returning COs applying to be a sponsor of SFSP must have all application requirements submitted to HNS by May 31, 2025. The following must be submitted with the application:

- Management Plan
- Budget
- CNPWeb Site and Sponsor Applications
- Any applications received after May 31, 2025,
 will not be considered for sponsorship but may be considered as an SFSP site

NEW SPONSORS

Becoming a Sponsor:

Community organizations new to operating the SFSP can start the process by completing the <u>SFSP Prospective Entity Form</u>.

Becoming a Site:

Schools and community organizations interested in becoming a site that serves summer meals should contact Health and Nutrition Services to confirm the site is in an eligible area. Request information by submitting a <u>Help Desk Ticket</u>

RURAL NON-CONGREGATE MEAL SERVICE SITES

Guidance: HNS 02-2025: Application for Summer Programs

Some SFSP/SSO sites can be approved to provide meals to-go, also known as non-congregate feeding sites.

Operators interested in serving non-congregate may offer:


- Home delivery multi-day meal issuance
- Home delivery bulk distribution
- Meal pick-up multi-day meal issuance
- Meal pick-up bulk distribution
- Mobile meal multi-day meal issuance
- Mobile meal bulk distribution





Overview



SUN Bucks: Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer (Summer-EBT)



Application to apply for Sun Bucks benefits.

Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES) in partnership with the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) has been approved to administer the Summer 2025 Electronic Benefit Transfer (Summer-EBT).

This program provides grocery-buying benefit of \$120 to low-income families with school-aged children who lose access to free or reduced-price school meals when schools are closed for the summer.

School-age children 6 to 16 are eligible based on the <u>eligibility flowchart</u>.



- SUN Bucks spends like SNAP with the same restrictions but isn't considered SNAP
- Provides families with school-aged children with money to be used on groceries over the summer.
- \$120 Benefit to those who qualify.
- Benefits expire/expunge 122 from the date they are made available

What is the school's role?

- 1. **Reporting student data and eligibility**: student level enrollment and free and reduced-price eligibility to ADE
 - 2. **Promoting SUN Bucks**: Direct famililes to the SUN Bucks Household application if their child is not automatically certified as eligible for the SUN Bucks benefit but who would otherwise qualify.

SUN Bucks and SPO Operators

Those sites that operate a Special Provision Option (SPO) like the Community Eligibility Program, or Provision 2 or 3 that do not collect school meal applications will only be able to report the following students:

SUN Bucks Household Application

SUNBUCKS APPLICATION IS NOW OPEN

School Food Authorities (SFAs) are required to:

- Ensure the application is available to households that believe they qualify for the SUN Bucks benefit but were not identified as eligible by the SFA.
- Report to ADE all students who attended schools participating in a Special Provision Option, who were not directly certified but may be eligible.

Families are encouraged to:

Visit the <u>SUN Bucks website</u> and Complete the SUN Bucks
 Eligibility Screener Guide. Click "How do I apply for SUN Bucks?"
 This is the first step to determine if your child will automatically receive SUN Bucks in Summer 2025 or if an application is needed.

Eligible households may:

- Complete and submit the 2025 SUN Bucks Application to the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) by August 5, 2025.
- Expect ADE to process the application and subsequently notify the household of approval/denial of benefits.

SUN Bucks: Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer (Summer-EBT)



Summer Electronic Benefit Transfer Program (Summer-EBT/SUN Bucks) provides grocery-buying benefits to low-income families with school-aged children who lose access to free or reduced-price school meals when schools are closed for the summer

- ▶ Will my child automatically receive SUN Bucks in 2025?
- ▶ How do I apply for SUN Bucks?
- ▶ How will I be receiving my benefits?
- ▶ How do I use my SUN Bucks benefits?
- ▶ What if I don't want my benefits or if I'd like to opt out?
- What to do if my benefits were stolen?
- Who do I contact if I have further questions?


Arizona Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) Direct Certification Outreach

- The goal is to automatically grant child nutrition benefits to eligible FDPIR participants.
- Indian Tribal Organizations (ITO) and state agencies will collaborate, ensuring automatic qualification for free school meals for students in FDPIR.

Arizona is home to 22 federally recognized Tribal Nations and hosts 8 FDPIR locations.

- Colorado River Indian Tribes
 Quechan Tribe
- Gila River Indian Community
 San Carols Apache Tribe
- Navajo Nation
- Pascua Yaqui Tribe

- Tohono O'odham Nation
- White Moutain Apache Tribe





The Arizona Department of Economic Security (DES), in collaboration with the Arizona Department of Education (ADE), has received approval to administer the Summer 2025 Electronic Benefit Transfer (Summer-EBT) program.

 This initiative provides eligible families with school-aged children financial assistance to purchase groceries during the summer months.

Students' current process **without** FDPIR agreement



How can we achieve this? Through a data sharing agreement..

- There are children participating in the FDPIR who could greatly benefit from direct certification.
- The FDPIR possesses readily available data that can facilitate matching.
- Suggest an existing method to automatically qualify children for Arizona's child nutrition programs.
- Emphasizes the SUN Bucks grocery benefit as a significant program that positively impacts communities.

Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement (ADE+AMS)



Cooperative Agreement with the Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA since March 2023. Funds were awarded to increase purchasing of local and region food for use in school meal programs.

Original award: \$4,380,245

Remaining amount: \$2,935,410

What you can do to access these funds:

- Talk to your food service director
- Complete an Interest Form (Schools or Producers)
- Learn more about the geographic preference to use during procurement of food
- Get input from students, families, community
- Join the AZ Farm to School Network


Farm to School Activities

Farm to school impacts the food system, the environment, and economic development.




PROGRAMS

REQUIRE INCOME VERIFICATION FOR SCHOOL BREAKFAST AND NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH

WHYTHIS MATTERS

SHIFTING THE ISP TO 60% (FROM 25%)

- 1. Impacted schools will have to return to collecting household applications for Free and Reduced-price meal benefits
- 2. Verification of information on applications (3% currently)
- 3. Meal charges, turns to debt
- 4. Impacts to participation, revenue



The proposed cuts to school meals would increase hardships for children and families across ARIZONA:



schools in **ARIZONA** would no longer be able to provide free school meals through CEP and would have to reinstate meal applications.



school districts in **ARIZONA**, listed on the reverse page, would be affected.



ARIZONA children attend schools that would no longer be able to offer meals at no charge to all students through CEP.1
