- → 2015: Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)

# Target Populations



## 21st CCLC Target Population

#### **STUDENTS**

At-risk students from prekindergarten to twelfth grade who attend schools with a high concentration of students from economically disadvantaged families

#### **ADULTS & FAMILIES**

Adult family members of students in the 21st CCLC program

Programs offer families of students ongoing, active and meaningful engagement in their children's education



# Who We Serve:

## **Program Eligibility**

ABSOLUTE PRIORITY - Applications proposing services to schools with at least 40% economically disadvantaged students.

## Non-Eligible Applicant(s)

- All Needs Assessments and School/Community Level Data must be based on the current and prior years' statistics. Therefore, the school must have been open for at least one year prior to application submission to be eligible.
- Online Schools may not apply for 21st CCLC funding.
- Joint Technological Education District (JTED) sites are not eligible to apply for 21st CCLC funding to serve students from multiple schools.

### **Grant Requirements Overview**

- The site must have at least 139 students enrolled
- Typical Grant Cycle: 3 to 5 years
- Annual Renewal Requirements:
  - Meet attendance & performance benchmarks
  - Submit required reports & financial documentation

# Program Requirements & Implementation Standards



## **Operational Requirements**

#### **Direct Student Services Offered:**

Minimum of 120 Days per Program Year

- Academic Year (before, after school, weekends, extended breaks or evenings)
  - A Minimum of 8 Hours per Week
  - A Minimum of 4 Days per Week
- Summer Term
  - May, June and July
  - Minimum of 64 hours

#### **Direct Family Services Offered:**

 Academic Year and Summer Term (ongoing)

## **Funding Amounts**

- Maximum # of applications per district/organization is 5 sites
- Minimum funding per year is \$50,000 per site = 42 regular attendees

- Maximum funding per year is \$120,000 per site = 100 regular attendees
  - \*all funding is contingent upon ADE's receipt of federal funds\*

## **Funding Formula**

#### 21st CCLC Budget Formula:

\$10 per student x # of days of programming x # regular attendees= total annual funding

For Maximum Funding **Annually**:

\$10 per student x 120 days of programming (minimum) x 100 regular attendees = \$120,000 annual budget



# Core Program Pillars

Academics, Youth Development & Family Engagement

The 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC initiative is the ONLY federally funded source dedicated exclusively to out-of-school-time programs.

#### **ACADEMICS**

**GOAL:** Offer students opportunities designed to raise student academic outcomes.

#### **YOUTH DEVELOPMENT**

**GOAL:** Offer students youth development opportunities designed to reinforce and complement the regular academic programs.

#### **FAMILY ENGAGEMENT**

**GOAL:** Offer families of all 21st CCLC students opportunities designed to empower families in active and meaningful engagement to raise student academic outcomes and youth development skills.

**STATED PROCESS OBJECTIVE:** Thirty percent (30%) of the regular attendees of 21st CCLC family members will participate in one or more literacy and/or related educational development opportunities.


### **Eligible Entities**

The term "eligible entity" means a local education agency (LEA), community-based organization, Indian tribe or tribal organization (as such terms are defined in section 4 of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Act), another public or private entity, or consortium of 2 or more such agencies, organizations or entities.



- Other Eligible Entity Model (OEE)


#### **Standard Model**

# Required Reporting

## **Annual Performance Report (APR)**

The United States Department of Education (ED) requires all 21st CCLC subgrantees to enter Summer and Academic Term data for submission to the U.S. Congress. The data collection application (21st CCLC APR) is available in the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) Connect portal.

## **Program Monitoring**

All sites will receive a Site Monitoring
Visit will need to be assigned to
the 21st CCLC Site
Monitoring Visit monitoring program.

This monitoring program includes the tasks where you will submit evidence, as requested by your Education Program Specialist.
