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<p>Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding)</p>	<p>Y</p>	<p>Social Distancing: Encourage staff and students to maintain social distancing (at least three feet apart), when feasible, and endeavor to employ other separation measures when maintaining three feet of distance is not feasible. Such efforts may include modified room layouts, (e.g., placing floor markings for social distancing), closing or staggering use of communal spaces.</p> <p>All students' desks and tables are surrounded by a clear plexiglas shield.</p> <p><i>Cohorting.</i> To the extent appropriate and feasible, the School will attempt to organize student and staff groupings so that they are as static as reasonably possible – i.e., have the same group of students stay with the same staff, and limit mixing between groups, if possible.</p>
<p>Handwashing and respiratory etiquette</p>	<p>Y</p>	<p>Students must engage in frequent hand washing or sanitizing upon arrival, before and after lunch, before and after playground use, after using the bathroom and after sneezing and coughing. The School will encourage and reinforce handwashing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or as appropriate, using hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.</p>

Coordination with State and local health officials	Y	<p>Upon learning of a positive COVID-19 test result in someone who has been in the School, the School will promptly seek guidance from local health officials to determine an appropriate course of action in light of the circumstances. At a minimum, the affected individual will be quarantined from the School on-site environment (including on-site support services or in-person instruction) and other responsive actions will be taken, as directed in consultation with local health officials or in compliance with their guidance. How the LEA will Ensure Continuity of Services?

All Aboard will provide for continuity of services as followed:

Students' Needs:

<p>Academic Needs</p>	<p>AACS implemented a summer school program focusing on both reading and math interventions. The summer program was offered to all incoming Kindergarten through Fifth Grade students.</p> <p>For the school year 2021-2022, additional instructional personnel have been added to staffing to further our efforts for academic recovery in core curriculum areas. Interventions will be conducted during the instructional day, and all teachers will provide targeted interventions after school to meet the needs of students with significant learning gaps.</p> <p>At the end of the 2020-2021 school year, teachers, led by consultants, met to create curriculum maps that identify essential standards and when they will be taught and when proficiency will be met. This will be an ongoing process throughout the school year to facilitate learning.</p>
<p>Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs</p>	<p>Counselors were added to the summer school program to support all students. These specialists met with small groups of children to provide social-emotional learning lessons and to meet the emotional needs of all students.</p> <p>AACS will implement Harmony SEL, an evidence-based social and emotional learning program. The program centers on building harmonious relationships and creating an environment where all students feel valued and heard.</p> <p>Counseling support will be provided as needed.</p>
<p>Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)</p>	<p>AACS provided all students with a free breakfast and lunch during the 20-21 school year and will continue to do so during the 21-22 school year.</p> <p>AACS will continue practices that follow local health department and CDC guidelines for contact tracing, isolation, and quarantine. If COVID-19 related issues require quarantining, all students will continue to have access to livestreaming, synchronous learning. Our school has a response plan and a designated isolation area for students or staff that develop signs and symptoms of COVID-19 illness at school. We are opening with increased safety precautions such as daily health screening protocols, physical distancing where possible and more frequent and improved cleaning and sanitation processes.</p> <p>Parents are responsible for determining their child's health status before arriving at school and for keeping their children at home should they present any symptoms of illness:</p>

Staff Needs:

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Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	School leaders will work with teachers to identify staff’s social, emotional, and mental health needs throughout the school year, and they will be addressed on an individual basis as needed.
